Sidewalk Ambassadors Join Old Town Chinatown Neighborhood

This fall Old Town Chinatown welcomed Portland Business Alliance's Sidewalk Ambassadors to the neighborhood. The Sidewalk Ambassadors – those friendly and helpful folks in green – are now located at NW 1st and Davis St.

The Sidewalk Ambassadors' office space may be new, but they have a long history in downtown. The program was started nearly twenty years ago by downtown's Business Improvement District to enhance the safety and security of the downtown area. Since 2002, however, the program has focused on hospitality. Last year alone, the Ambassadors helped 71,664 people visiting downtown with directions, restaurant recommendations and information about upcoming events.

The Sidewalk Ambassadors are also always ready in case of an emergency. In September, the Ambassadors put their crisis management skills to work when a gas main leak near Pioneer Square shut down train service during rush hour. The Ambassadors were first on the scene helping guide people while the train service was suspended.

The Sidewalk Ambassadors' friendly personalities and helpful resources make them a welcome addition to the neighborhood.

TriMet Update: North Mall Open



Construction continues near Union Station

The North Mall is open to vehicle traffic, and on-street parking is available on 5th and 6th Avenues. On the sidewalks, street and rail system poles are going up, brick restoration is nearly complete and public art is being replaced.

Major rail construction work is underway between Union Station and the westbound ramp of the Steel Bridge, and the Union Station MAX platform on NW 6th Ave. is taking shape. At the North Terminus, tracks are laid to loop the MAX back through the Mall. Work will continue through the new year at the Steel Bridge as crews prepare to connect the new light rail into the existing MAX line next summer.

At least, that's what they say on The **Shanghai Tunnel Tour**. The 1 1/2 hour tour, led by **Cascade Geographic Society**, guides participants through a captivating history of our neighborhood's infamous past. The stories weaved throughout the tour incorporate numerous cultures that have played a part in Old Town Chinatown's history.

Prepare to be fascinated by tales of complex tunnels below Old Town Chinatown, and to savor a taste of the mysterious passages as you head below ground at **Hobo's**. Do not, however, expect to walk through the underground passages - numerous developments over decades have closed up the majority of the passageways. The key to this tour is to delve into the intriguing stories and to be surprised, spooked, and amused at the notorious history of what was once called "The Old North End." You will never regard your neighborhood in the same way again.

Celebrate First Thursdays in OTCT

Old Town Chinatown will present many **First Thursday** offerings on December 6th. **Portland Art Center** will be opening several different exhibits, including their fund raiser for the upcoming year, **PDX Panels**. Emerging, mid-career, and established artists were presented with wooden panels "to use as they wish." Come support one of OTCT's greatest attractions.

Several artists from **Portland Saturday Market** will be featured at **Northwest Resource Federal Credit Union**. 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University of Oregon Portland Makes a New Home in Old Town Chinatown

The University of Oregon's deep ties to the Rose City date back to the founding of the University of Oregon Law School in Portland in the late 1880s. The University will open a new chapter in its Portland history in 2008 when it brings together all but one of its Portland programs in a single landmark structure in the heart of Old Town Chinatown.

The **White Stag Block** will house everything from journalism, law and business to architecture and allied arts in a beautifully refurbished, historic facility boasting the latest in sustainable technologies and green building design.

The University of Oregon is proud to

be playing a key role in the renaissance of the Portland's historic Old Town Chinatown neighborhood.

The University will mark a milestone in the neighborhood's revitalization in the fall of 2008 when it hosts a public grand opening. The complex, at 70 NW Couch St. is made up of the historic White Stag Building and portions of the adjacent **Bickel and Skidmore buildings**.

On the outside, UO Portland is restoring the buildings' turn-of-the-century facades. Inside, the University is performing state-of-the-art upgrades. Beginning in spring 2008, a handful of academic departments will begin holding classes in the White Stag Block, highlighted by the School of Journalism and Communication's Turnbull Center. By the start of the 2008-2009 academic year, the nearly 90,000 square-foot facility will house all but one University of Oregon Portland program, as well as a library, a Duck Store with a café, and administrative offices for seventy-five to 100 employees.

The University of Oregon looks forward to enriching its Rose City roots while making new connections in the blossoming, vibrant and historic Old Town Chinatown district. Go to <http://pdx.uoregon.edu/> for more information.

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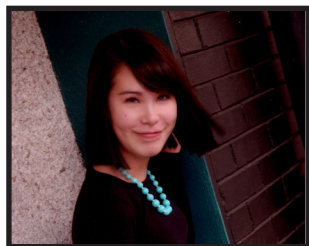
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Remembering Tracey Sparling

Young Cyclist's Death a Call to Action

The crash that killed Tracey Sparling reverberated throughout Old Town.

While the accident occurred just outside of our neighborhood, Tracey had firmly bonded herself to Old Town. Just 19 years old, Tracey worked at **PDX Design Company**, the family firm that is re-designing the Old Town Chinatown web site.

Eric and Soyung Key, who run PDX Design Company, are devastated. "We expected that Tracey would be with us for a long time. She was a star employee," said Soyung. Tracey often had dinner with the Keys after work, sometimes at their home.

Tracey's parents live in Salem, but traveled to Portland to get a sense of her life here. They visited PDX Design Company and **PNCA**, where Tracey was a student. Tracey and her boyfriend had just been approved for an apartment together, and had gone out for

a celebratory dinner the night before she died.

Out of this tragedy comes a great deal of reflection and action. Portland is legendary for its bicycle culture. Like any culture, though, it needs care and feeding. **The Bicycle Transportation Alliance (BTA)** is dedicated to bicycle advocacy in Oregon. Karl Rohde, BTA's Government Relations & Public Affairs Director, wrote in his blog the day after Tracey's death: "We encourage everyone to turn their emotions over this tragedy into constructive action. There are all sorts of opportunities to be a bike advocate when you are not on your bike. We will continue our efforts to improve the safety of bicycling through engineering, education and enforcement."

The BTA advocates for safer streets for cyclists. They also run bicycle safety education programs. The "**Safe Routes to School**" program has introduced 40,000 students to bicycle safety. The annual **Bike Commute Challenge** is a friendly workplace challenge, with benefits for companies and individual commuter-cyclists.

Tracey's death has shocked and saddened many in Old Town. The loss of a young, talented person to an avoidable crash is a loss that we can ill afford. Her death calls us to action. You can make a difference - the BTA, right in our neighborhood, is a great place to start.

Resident Brings Lessons from India

The Crier caught up with OTCT resident Carol McCreary upon her return from the **World Toilet Summit** in New Delhi.

What was the World Toilet Summit all about? Who organized it?

The World Toilet Organization (WTO) is behind this annual event and expo, but it was organized by Sulabh International. Sulabh was founded nearly 40 years ago by Bindeshwar Pathak to complete Ghandi's mission of restoring the human rights and dignity of "untouchables," whose lives are devoted to the demeaning task of carrying away "nightsoil." This requires radical social transformation, employment generation and toilet construction. Today Sulabh has built and operates 6,500 public toilet complexes for municipalities throughout India and recently completed five in Kabul.

How did you happen to attend?

The American Restroom Association, which is a WTO member, asked me to co-author a paper on federal health policy gaps regarding restrooms in the USA. After that, Sulabh International offered me a travel grant and Dr. Pathak and his staff gave me special opportunity to learn about their management innovations and sustainable technologies.

Did you learn any lessons for Old Town Chinatown?

Yes. Communities can build architecturally coherent restrooms in historic places of interest - such as Ankeny Square - that are clean, safe for children, and serve rich and poor alike.

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Building Projects Planned for 2008

The multi-faceted Waterfront Park Ankeny Burnside project is moving ahead. **The Portland Development Commission (PDC)** and **Portland Parks & Recreation** are negotiating an agreement to assign construction of the public improvements to PDC. This includes new public restrooms on the north side of **Fire Station #1**. The site for **Portland Saturday Market's** 2008 season will be in Ankeny Plaza and under the Burnside Bridge on both sides of Naito Parkway, where two-way traffic will be diverted to the northbound lanes. **The Bill Naito Company's** planning for multi-block development and a PDC parking study are also underway.

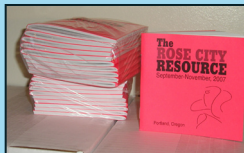
For North Old Town Chinatown, the City has chosen the **Housing Authority of Portland** to own and develop a Resource Center. This will include the men's shelter that is currently housed at **Transition Projects Inc. (TPI)** as well as 50-80 permanent housing units for very low income residents, coupled with supportive services. The City, PDC and TPI have determined that Block 25 (Dirty Duck Block) is the best site for this facility because other sites were unavailable or not accessible enough for the facility. Block 25 will also contain a redeveloped **Blanchet House** and address the City's parking obligation to provide 130 parking spaces for **NW Natural**.

PDC is working with **Innovative Housing** to renovate the 96-unit **Lyndon Musolf Manor**. With financial assistance from PDC, the **Housing Authority of Portland** is purchasing the **Grove Hotel** to serve a very low income population. **The Yards at Union Station** is adding units to reach a total of 610. Development planning is also underway for the Broadway Corridor area south of **Union Station**.

The new Rose City Resource

Nine thousand copies of **Street Roots'** new 80-page **Rose City Resource** -- Portland's most comprehensive list of services for people experiencing homelessness and poverty -- hit the streets in late September. The booklet serves people who may not have access to a telephone, computer or agency staff. It allows individuals the opportunity to be independent in their search for services that fit their specific needs. Ten thousand more copies are being published in December.

With the creation of the new quarterly pocket-sized booklet, the **Street Roots** newspaper has four more pages of in-depth news, and a vendor page with stories of people who sell the newspaper.

The Portland-based international humanitarian aid organization **Mercy Corps** will open its global headquarters in Old Town Chinatown in late summer 2009. The aid group is planning to renovate the historic **Skidmore Fountain Building** and will add a new structure on an adjacent parking lot. Ground-breaking is scheduled to take place in early spring next year.

Up to 200 Mercy Corps employees will work in the Portland headquarters, but the building will be more than office space. A highlight of the new building will be a global learning and action center -- a world-class interactive space that will inform, engage, and catalyze people to take action around global poverty and hunger.

Another feature of Mercy Corps' new building will be a street level presence for **Mercy Corps Northwest**, the agency's local economic development arm that helps small businesses and entrepreneurs. Mercy Corps Northwest takes the best practices of the agency's microfinance work worldwide and offers people in the Portland area business skills training, mentoring, asset-building, and small loans.
